

# Personal DailyWalk

**November 20-26, 2017**



**Monday: Matthew 5:13-16** Salt and Light – What do they bring to the world? What do you bring – has your spirit lost some of its saltiness? – has your light dimmed? Pray to the Holy Spirit to keep you salty and to energize your light so that God may be glorified through you.

**Tuesday: Isaiah 12** Reflect on Isaiah 12; create a gratitude journal and begin listing all the glorious things God has done, giving praise to the Holy One.

**Wednesday: Ephesians 2:11-22** We read about how Christ has broken down the wall that divides us, yet it feels like we (mankind) continue to try to rebuild that very same wall that Christ demolished. Reflect on your own feelings on the wall that divides us, and pray for God to show you His way.

**Thursday: Thanksgiving Day: Psalm 95:1-7** Pray in thanksgiving today, worshiping the God who made you, has mercy on you, and strengthens you for His good purposes.

**Friday: Acts 10 ...** <sup>15</sup> The voice said to him again, a second time, “What God has made clean, you must not call profane.”... Do you find that statement as powerful as I do? I wonder if we sometimes forget that through the blood of Jesus Christ, we have been made clean and will remain clean. Not perfect, but clean and right with God. Pray in thanksgiving for God, giving us a chance to be clean and right with Him.

**Saturday: Galatians 3:23-29** Another reminder that Christ came to break down the walls that divide us from each other. We are all one in Christ. Today, when you look or interact with others, look at them as Christ would ... as part of the family ... heirs to God's kingdom. Pray blessings on God's family.

**Sunday: Christ the King: Matthew 25:31-46** As Lutheran's, we sometimes rest a little too securely on saved by faith alone. Yes, we are saved by our faith and we can't earn our way into eternal life, but if we don't respond to the gospel and live a transformed life, can we truly say we have been saved by faith? Reflect on your response to the saving sacrifice of Jesus, and pray that you respond to the least of these.
